From the Interim Minister's Desk

Some of you may remember that my first Sunday preaching at First Church, I likened Interim Ministry to Foster Parenting. The comparisons between the two are numerous. As we prepare to walk through our first Holy Week together, a special Easter tradition comes to mind. Needing to blend the Easter traditions of several different families of origin, I decided to do a traditional Easter Egg Hunt, but with a twist. One of the families of origin in my blended family celebrated Easter by searching for a single basket filled with real eggs and toys. Another family celebrated by hunting for dozens of plastic eggs filled with candy. Another didn't celebrate Easter at all. And still another was given a bag of their favorite Easter candy and told to not eat it all at once. Knowing there were many different Easter traditions to consider, I ultimately ended up creating a Jeffers family tradition. Easter breakfast at church, followed by Easter worship followed by a hunt for plastic eggs filled with puzzle pieces. My vision was we would assemble the puzzle together as the pieces were found and we would know we had found all of the pieces once the puzzle was complete. But one of my "spirited" children invented a tradition of his own – withholding one of the puzzle pieces so that everyone would spend days trying to find the last egg and puzzle piece to complete the puzzle. We did that every Easter, until one year, we didn't. The tradition had been fun and meaningful, but it had run its course, and we decided to create some new traditions, more practical and meaningful for my growing family. We still remember fondly hunting for eggs and never finding the last piece, but new memories and new traditions have been made throughout the years. We have sweet memories of Easter's past and we have made room for new Easter experiences. We consider all a rich part of who we are.

It was fun going down memory lane as I prepared this month's pastor's column. The original column was written to explain the reasoning that went into the announced shift in the telling of the Passion narrative during worship, specifically the use of the cross and Via Dolorosa, a ritual that is out of sync with the Passion narrative which would not have such an experience until several days later, on Good Friday. As interim, it seemed a good interim task would be to help the church develop a Holy Week narrative more in line with the historic Christian narrative. Recognizing that the Palm Sunday ritual was beloved by many, I asked many questions, spent a fair amount of time in prayer, before consulting with the Deacons and deciding to keep all the key elements in place, but in a more historically accurate sequence. The change was announced and there was a fair amount o outcry and disappointed. Several members wrote articulate letters of protest to key church leaders and myself asking to change it back. The Deacons voted to return to the original way of doing Palm Sunday and reconsider change at some later date. If, in my work as interim, I was operating on a win/lose mentality, I would consider the unwillingness to change this ritual as a loss. I could have been frustrated by a church "stuck in its ways and unwilling to change. I could have picked up my marbles and gone home mad. Instead, I used this experience as an opportunity to learn more about the church, how it understands Congregational process and how it expects to make decisions. I learned more about the need for better transparency and mutual trust between senior leaders and myself. I learned to listen for unspoken voices. I learned that sometimes the right thing to do, isn't always the right thing to do. While I was hoping to teach all of you about more historic accuracy, you taught me some fine nuances of living together in community in a historic traditional church. No winners and losers here in the saga of the Via Dolorosa. With honest, thoughtful, respectful communication we all win.

I am very much looking forward to walking through Holy Week with all of you. As you will see looking at our Holy Week Schedule of Events, Holy Week at First Church is filled with traditions and opportunities to worship. If you review the schedule, you will see that many beloved traditions will take place exactly as you expect them to. A few traditions, like Maundy Thursday come with a twist. I am hoping you will receive this Holy Week as an opportunity to think about why we do what we do. Like the Easter Egg Puzzle tradition, the way we do Holy Week this year may not last forever. But if God is still speaking, as we so fondly say in the UCC, how will we deepen our faith as the Resurrection speaks into our lives once more? Joyful resurrection, all!

The subject of change has been a frequent theme of our Spire messages, and for very good reason. For the past three years, church leaders have had to concentrate their efforts on navigating a unique period in our history to deal with the Covid-19 pandemic and the severe responses needed to contain it. We owe a huge debt of gratitude to everyone involved for getting us through to this point.

But this difficult environment is, in large measure, behind us. We have entered a period of renewed optimism and courage to meet the challenges that almost all religious organizations face. Our interim minister is leading us in examining every area of our church organization, and sharpening our vision of changes that most certainly are necessary if we are to meet those challenges and grow our faith community, change our financial trajectory, and meet the promises set forth in our recently written vision and mission statements.

Change is difficult is a popular axiom, and is so because it is a simple truth. It is so much easier to stick with the familiar and avoid the hard work of reflecting on how our present course of action is no longer sufficient to meet the challenges that face us. Already we have all seen how boards and committees have strived to begin the process of revitalizing our physical plant and organizational structure. We have also seen how these changes have already had such a positive, uplifting influence in so many areas. The renovated Congregational Hall, and the updating of our sanctuary are just two of the physical changes that give us all a sense of positivity and cheerfulness that we are beginning on the right course toward a brighter future for our church. And beyond the physical changes, there is energy and enthusiasm in the spirit that surrounds worship, celebration with music, the children, and the launch of our Open and Affirming exploration.

But we are writing to tell you that there is more to come. Some wonderful, fresh ideas have been proposed and are in the process of refinement. There is a renewed sense of confidence that change is to be welcomed because we are capable of managing it to our advantage.

As always, the secret to success is to have every member involved in the change process. Our future as a church depends on every member's contribution, and the modifications to our church organizational structure that are contemplated are designed to do just that.

So please stay tuned. As we have said, this is an exciting time in the history of the First Congregational Church in Wallingford. We conclude this message with this quote:

"Change is the law of life. And those that look only to the past and present are certain to miss the future."


A Message from the Flower Committee



From The Minister of Music

Music plays a large role historically in the Lenten and Easter Liturgical year. From the chants of the 10th century through the chorales of the Protestant Reformation, through centuries of music-making in all our Christian denominations, the ritual and story of Holy Week has been musically expressed by the creativity of countless men and women all over the globe. The emotion of the music of whatever type can evoke in us feelings that touch us in no other way. As we journey through this last part of Lent and Holy Week itself, you might notice what music, if any, speaks to you.

Sunday, March 26, 2023 at the 10:00 a.m. service the choir will sing excerpts from Pepper Choplin's vocal work, **Once Upon a Tree.** Choplin gives us a look at the conditions in the city of Jerusalem and what it was like in the upper room and the Garden of Gethsemane. You might note that in this latter piece, a musical device is used when Jesus can speak and at the same time you can get people's reactions. Unfortunately, we are unable to do the entire work and story and will have to leave the rest to your imagination and historical knowledge.

Palm Sunday, April 2, 2023:


We will sing "The Palms" by Jean Faure. A children's choir will sing as well as the traditional "pick up". Please be ready to rehearse either on the pulpit side of the balcony or in the seats below. Music will be provided. Kathy Wallace will be directing. The Palms will be sung very early in the service so the children may go to Sunday School. It is a communion Sunday.

Good Friday service: April 7, 2023, at 12 noon in the sanctuary.

Come and walk the Via Dolorosa to the cross. Hear "Voices from the Crowd" as they speak about what it was like being in Jerusalem that Holy Week. You will hear some poignant songs sung like "On the Willows" from Godspell, "Were You There", Ten Thousand Angels Cried" and other songs that were written to acknowledge Good Friday.

Children will be rehearsing "The Palms" after church on March 19 and March 26 as well as about 9:30 a.m. on Saturday April 1 in conjunction with the Palm Cross making.

Easter Sunday: April 9, 2023, at 10:00 a.m. worship. We will close the service with the singing of the "Hallelujah Chorus" by G. F. Handel. Kathy Wallace will be directing. Music will be provided. Come to the front of the sanctuary during the last hymn or sing from your seat. We welcome all to sing at this joyous moment.

Open and Affirming (ONA), is a designation for United Church of Christ congregations that publicly affirm LGBTQ+ people and welcome them into their ministry.

In the process of developing our church's current vision and mission statement, it became clear we deeply value inclusivity and hope to be a place where all feel welcome. This led to the decision to work toward becoming an ONA church, and a committee has been formed to guide us through the process. The committee members are Pam Walker, Sandy McKenna, Cathy Knight, Steve Knight, Erica Haddad, Jeanette Gross, and Kathy Filkins.

The Open and Affirming process will provide opportunities for discussion on how we can help our church be welcoming and inclusive for all. We strongly encourage everyone to participate, and invite open, respectful conversation on the topics being discussed. Please contact a member of the ONA committee if you have questions on the process or what it means to be an ONA church.

You may ask why we need to go through this process when we have always considered ourselves a welcoming congregation.

Many churches denounce LGBTQ+ people, and they can't assume any church will be a safe and welcoming space for them and their families. Publicly stating we are an ONA church will send a clear message that we feel we are all God's children and should be treated with equal respect and dignity.

We invite you all to open your hearts to this process and keep in mind our church's vision statement, which says:

Our faith – rooted in the compassion and teachings of Jesus Christ – is the foundation of our love for one another and service to the world around us.

COMMUNITY AND WORLD SERVICE



The Community & World Service Committee has used mission money once a month the past few months to buy an evening meal for 50 homeless people living at a hotel in Middletown.

The Wallingford Shelter had to close due to Covid and the people staying there were moved to the hotel where they can be in separate bedrooms. The government is paying for their stay. We sent \$500 to World Central Kitchen to help pay for food for the earthquake victims in Turkey and Syria and people leaving Ukraine.

We also gave \$500 to the Chrysalis shelter for women to help with expenses and \$3,000 toward the cost of the church's youth mission trip this year.
