A Note from the Pastor's Desk



One of the stories I remember all too vividly from my childhood is the story of the little boy who cried wolf. I remember my parents asking me or one of my siblings "are you being the little boy who cried wolf?" whenever they thought we were lying or perhaps seriously exaggerating the truth. For those of you who don't know the story, a little boy cried, "Wolf!" when he wanted attention. There was no wolf, but he knew that crying wolf would get people to come to him to help him. He did that several times. For the first few times he cried, "Wolf!" people came running to save him. But the fourth time he cried, "Wolf!" there really was a wolf, but nobody came, because he had done it so many times before when there was no wolf, no one believed him. The fourth time, nobody came, and the little boy was eaten by the wolf.

I had really hoped my June Pastor's column would be one reveling in the joys of spring and new life – of the promise of resurrection and rebirth and renewal- a column rejoicing in all the wonderful things happening at First Church of Wallingford. Maybe, if all goes well, I will write that column for the July Spire.

This month's message is one that I did not know I would need to write when I started here in December. I did not know in December that a \$1.25 million endowment would not be enough to sustain First Congregational Church for generations to come. I thought a strategic Capital Campaign in the future, a planned giving initiative soon, and a robust pledge campaign now would be what was needed to proceed with my interim agenda. What I did not understand in December is that in order to support the existing program and maintain and beautify the physical plant, we have *exceeded* the recommended 4% draw on the endowment by more than \$85,000 this year. Once all our bills are paid for fiscal year 2022-23, that extra draw over the last several years will have reduced the accessible portion of the endowment to just \$750,000. At the rate we are drawing on the endowment, the accessible portion of the endowment will be down to \$0 within 6 years. It is hard to imagine that such a vital church will not have the resources to continue to exist within 6 years.

First Church of Wallingford has faithfully served the Wallingford community for close to 350 years. What are we going to do to ensure the church will not just exist, but thrive for 350 years more?

One of the unexpected tasks I am taking on as your interim pastor is to take a multi-faceted approach to financial viability. Stewardship education is being implemented now, and Planned Giving education and a Capital Campaign are being considered for the not-too-distant future. But before we look at the larger picture of financial viability, I am looking at the current Stewardship Campaign as an indicator of whether there is a commitment to funding a budget that will sustain the ministry of the church without needing to draw down the principal of the endowment or cut current programs. The solution to the situation in which we find ourselves is not easy. The primary resource we are looking toward to stop the financial hemorrhage and meet the budget is for church members and friends to prayerfully consider substantially increasing their giving to the church.

The second is a robust effort to increase revenue by sharing our facilities with compatible users at a fair market rate. (with a reduced rate for non- profits) A last resort would be cut programs, staff, and defer needed maintenance. What happens now is up to you.

The information I just shared with you is the hard-to-hear truth. We need to get over our distaste for talking about money and begin to explore how our giving reflects our understanding of our blessings and our understanding of who God calls us to be as a Christian community. No one is going to bail us out of this quandary but us. I am not crying, "Wolf," when there is no wolf. There is a wolf. I am calling us to honest conversations, to pray, and to act to stabilize the future of this church so it might serve generations to come.

In very short order, the Annual Meeting will be upon us, and one of the most important topics of discussion will be the Vision Board and Ministry Team model that, upon approval by a vote in that meeting, will replace the board and committee organizational structure under which we presently operate. The Ministry Teams proposal has been very positively received by everyone to whom creators Debbie Voelker and Lorraine Westervelt have introduced it, and we are moving ahead under the assumption that the vote will be for approval.

The two of us see wonderful possibilities, and we are convinced that you will as well. As you know, there will be six Ministries (Worship, Faith Formation, Congregational Care, Mission and Outreach, Membership, and Administration), under which will be dozens of opportunities to join smaller teams that devote their time to a particular task or project. Gone will be the long multi-year committee commitments, the responsibility for a whole range of tasks, and time-consuming duty to carry out functions you might not really be interested in.

In its place will be a fresh approach. To be clear, all of the usual work and customary tasks of the church still need to be accomplished. But, the hope is that with this model, the customary tasks will be redistributed in much more manageable portions, much more specifically designed to bring out the joy in church participation. Are meaningful worship experiences important to you? We have a team for you in Worship Ministry. Do you like to assist with receptions? Then the Hospitality Team is perfect for you. Do you value the social events that bring our church family together in fellowship? Then the Fellowship Team needs you. If working with young people is your forte, you will find fulfillment on the Youth Group team or the Church School team. Do you have creative fundraising ideas? Let us point you toward the Administrative Ministry coordinators. Those are just some of the many possibilities.

We cannot do this without <u>you</u> and <u>your</u> passion and <u>your</u> ministry. We are asking every single member and friend of the First Congregational Church of Wallingford to look through all the possible team experiences available under this Ministry model. We are positive that you will find a thoroughly comfortable and fulfilling place to join with others with similar interests. We then ask for you to come forward and joyfully volunteer to share some of the time and talent that make you a special and valued member of this church family. And, by all means, if you have questions about how all of this will work, please ask!

Our church is not just a beautiful building to which we come to worship God. It is the people in it, working together to make a strong faith family, that make this a special place to be. You have special talents and interests that your faith family welcomes and needs. We ask you to please find your niche and sign up. If you will do that, you will find it to be a very uplifting and joyful experience, even in the few hours a month of your time that you can afford to spend.

We welcome you with open arms.

Call to The Annual Meeting

June 11, 2023

To the members of The First Congregational Church of Wallingford, Connecticut: Notice is hereby given of the 347th Annual Meeting of the Church to be held Sunday, June 11, 2023 at 11:15 a.m. via hybrid meeting, both in person in Congregational Hall and via the Zoom application for the following purposes:

- 1. To receive Annual Reports from Ministers, Officeholders, Boards, Committees, and organizations of the Church;
- 2. To act upon any business arising from such reports;
- 3. Discussion and action regarding changing the organizational structure of the church from the present Board and Committee structure to the Vision Board and Ministry Team structure;
- 4. Discussion and action to substitute a pilot implementation of the proposed organizational structure with a Vision Board & Ministries of Teams for references in Article V IX of the By-Laws regarding the Council, Boards and Committees. During this pilot, which will run from July 1, 2023 until June 30, 2024, the Moderators and Treasurer will continue as the signatory authorities as authorized by a positive vote of the church members attending the Annual Meeting of the Church and also by authorizing the election of the Vision Board in lieu of the Council and the Administration Ministry functioning in lieu of the Board of Trustees;
- 5. Discussion and action on allowing the Board of Trustees/Administration Ministry to establish a lease of church property to DISH TV to house their transmission equipment in the church steeple and a small space in Congregational Hall;
- 6. To act upon the Proposed Budget for July 1, 2023-June 30, 2024;
- 7. To receive the Report of the Nominating Committee;
- 8. To elect Officeholders, Vision Board and Team Coordinators for 2023-2024;
- 9. To act upon such other matters as may properly come before the meeting.



A Letter from the Church Council

Dear Church Members and Friends,

The Church Council is proposing a new organizational structure for our church that is full of exciting potential! This proposal was developed by the Vision and Mission Implementation Team. The Ministry Teams Model, consisting of a Vision Board and six Ministries with Teams, would replace our current Council, Board and Committee format.

Advantages of the Ministry Teams Model:

- Offers many flexible short-term opportunities for meaningful volunteer and project involvement that encourages every volunteer to follow their interests and contribute their special talents, skills and passions
- Inspires volunteerism as we share in the work of our church in new ways
- Reenergizes our commitment to living into our mission with creativity and love
- Welcomes participation from church members and friends (folks who aren't yet members, but who are seeking ways to connect and engage in ministry)

The **Vision Board**, in lieu of the Church Council, would empower our work towards our church's vision and mission, and would delegate to **Ministry Teams** the authority to achieve these goals. It would serve as the executive body of the church between meetings of the congregation to manage our strategic issues. The Vision Board would be composed of the elected church officers (Moderators, Clerk and Treasurer), and a coordinator from each of the six Ministries. The Pastor would serve as an ex-officio member.

Six Ministries: Worship; Faith Formation; Membership; Congregational Care; Mission and Outreach; and Administration would be created to plan and implement the programs and ministries of our church. Each Ministry would include five elected coordinators, as well as volunteer team leaders and team members. As they do presently, church staff members would serve as resources and advisors to the Vision Board and the Ministries and their Teams.

Please review the enclosed outline of the six Ministries with teams that offer opportunities for each of us to support the work of our church. Members and friends are encouraged to volunteer for the team or teams that speak to their passions and talents without long-term commitments.

This new structure, already in place in many UCC churches, opens up almost endless possibilities for member participation and the joy that comes from working with others and contributing each person's unique talents in a comfortable and immediate way.

PROPOSED MINISTRIES with TEAMS

FAITH FORMATION MINISTRY

The Faith Formation Ministry will plan, coordinate, and implement spiritual and faith development programs for children, youth and adults.

Teams: Adult Education Team, Church School Team, Confirmation Team, Youth Group Team.

MEMBERSHIP MINISTRY

The Membership Ministry will design and carry out fellowship programs and events for members and for welcoming and recruiting new members to the congregation. It will develop and support communication avenues to inspire people. It will work to welcome our involvement in fundraising activities.

Teams: Communications Team, Fellowship Team, New Member Team, Nominating Team, Scholarship Team, Rummage Sale Team, Church Fair Team

CONGREGATIONAL CARE MINISTRY

The Congregational Care Ministry will initiate and oversee plans and programs for the care and welfare of members.

Teams: Good Cheer Team, Hospitality Team, Pastoral Relations Team, Visitation Team

MISSION AND OUTREACH MINISTRY

The Mission and Outreach Ministry will be responsible for the education and involvement of the congregation in the needs and social concerns of local and worldwide communities.

Teams: Community Action Team, Mission Fund Team, Open and Affirming Team, Wellness Groups Liaison Team.


ADMINISTRATION MINISTRY

The Administration Ministry will hold, care for and conserve the physical property of the Church and it will manage the investment and dispersal of funds of the Church.
