A Message From the Interim Minister



As I write this, it is not yet Thanksgiving, but for weeks I have been busy thinking about and planning Advent and Christmas worship. This week I made the decision to decorate my house this year, even if I only set up a few mangers and a Christmas tree; I want my house to look like Christmas. I am going to do some cooking, some old and new recipes, because I want my house to taste and smell like Christmas. And I am going to dust off my favorite Christmas CD, Handel's Young Messiah, to fill my home with music and dancing. But one thing I am not going to do is to go on a frantic search for the perfect gift for people I love. Instead, I will continue with my decade's old practice of honoring the people on my Christmas list by purchasing alternative gifts to help people around the world.

My family has been creative in their alternative gift choices. Purchasing a sewing machine to help a single mother in Mozambique start a sewing business. Making a microloan through Kiva to a man in El Salvador to buy rope to weave and sell colorful hammocks. Paying a month's tuition for a girl in Kenya to go to school. Helping a family in the Philippines to build an indoor toilet at their home. Buying warm CWS blankets for people living on the streets. Buying a sheep through Heifer Project. My heart is warmed every time I think about how my holiday gift giving helps to make the world a better place.

This year's gift giving is taking on a new meaning for me. This year, my gift giving will be focused on providing for the basic needs of the refugee family that our Meriden -Wallingford sponsor group, Starfish, expects to welcome in the next few months. The refugees will arrive with nothing other than the clothes on their back, needed documents, and maybe a keepsake or two. They will need everything from furniture to food to toiletries to clothes to cleaning supplies to cell phones to linens. There is a whole list of essential items that Welcome Corp/Iris suggests. I am using that as my shopping list this year.

The timing of this welcome project brings to mind another pair of refugees, one of whom was pregnant, who were tired and cold and hungry and scared and determined to do what was required of them, despite their poverty and despite their fear. They traveled together, until one night, it was time for the woman to deliver her baby, but there was no place for them to stay. They went through Bethlehem looking for an open door, for lodging, for a safe place to bring new life into the world. But of course, there was no room anywhere in Bethlehem because there were many travelers in the region. But as the story goes, they found a place to rest and give birth to new life. That new life came into the world, and the world has never been the same. Jesus was born a refugee. How will you honor him?

Blessings and joy as you celebrate this sacred season! Pastor Meredith

Happy Holidays!





Hello church school and youth group families, and with that, the holiday season is in full swing! I am beyond appreciative to everyone who has helped me over the last couple months in preparation for our Thanksgiving Scavenger Hunt, which was a huge success. I am honored to be a part of such an important tradition as we were able to help many families with the support of our congregation and youth group. As in years past, I believe that this event is an important aspect of the beginning of our advent season that reinforces the true meaning of the holidays.

With December beginning, we will have two more regular youth group meetings this calendar year. While I posted a schedule in the November spire, please make sure to check your emails regularly as this schedule was made before collaborating with other youth groups. As a result, December 15th may be subject to change to accommodate a youth group meeting with all three churches. However, the December 1st meeting is confirmed! In addition to our regular meetings, we will also have other opportunities for our youth to get involved in our church. If any high school student is in need of community service hours, we are looking for volunteer "elves" during our annual Christmas fair. If you want to know more about that opportunity, please contact me!

For church school, there is one date that we will not be having classes, so please keep this in mind. This date will be Sunday December 29th (between Christmas and New Year). Additionally, in anticipation of low attendance on Sunday December 1st (Thanksgiving weekend), we will just be doing a holiday party during class time with a movie and/or activities. As with other rotational Sundays, all children will report straight to class. For this particular day, all students will go to the library instead of their individual classrooms. All other Sunday classes in December will run as normal.

If any families have not received children's offering envelopes, they are available for pick up in the pre-k classroom (located on the right side of the library, closest to the music room). While it is not a requirement for children to bring an offering envelope to their classes each week, I believe it is an important practice for children to understand the responsibilities that adult members have within our congregation. Even if a quarter, dime, or penny is placed in a child's envelope each week, it is far less about the monetary amount being contributed than it is about the habit of contributing to our congregation and the importance behind it. Meredith and I will be working closely to develop workshops for the spring that will familiarize our children with some of the aspects and traditions of our weekly services and collecting offering will be one of them, along with communion. I hope that by incorporating these practices into our classrooms, children can be more involved in church services when classes are not running. Similarly, I hope to grow an understanding of what goes on for parents in the weekly service while classes are running.

As always, please do not hesitate to reach out with any questions, comments or concerns. I am looking forward to diving deeper into this holiday season with you all!

The function of the Pastoral Relations Committee (PRC) is to support a healthy relationship between the pastor and congregants with the goal of enhancing the church's ministry. We would like to remind our congregation of how the PRC can best serve you. Below are ideas on how to best communicate with both this committee and Pastor Meridith.

- Direct Communication is Key! We encourage anyone who has feedback regarding church life to
 communicate directly with Pastor Meredith or church staff. If you do not feel comfortable doing so, please
 contact a member of the PRC and we would be glad to sit together to solve problems. We believe direct
 communication is key. If communication comes to us anonymously, we are not able to sit with you directly
 to answer your questions.
- 2. **Communicate Often!** If you have ideas or needs that should be addressed, please try to bring them up promptly so they can be addressed in a timely manner this will keep issues from compounding over time.
- 3. **Be Respectful and Empathetic:** When communicating with others, please be mindful of how you are posing your ideas. If this feedback were coming to you, how would you receive it? Difficult conversations should be relayed in person, as it is challenging to ascertain the meaning behind a text or an email.
- 4. **Provide Potential Solutions:** Be open to helping to find a solution. You do not have to be the person executing the solution, though try to come to the table with some ideas. Often the best ideas come from a friendly collaborative space.

The PRC encourages you to reach out to us should you need help communicating any concerns you have. We understand that clear, direct and respectful communication is the cornerstone of our church. Without these principles, the climate of the church can change quickly. We ask that we all work together to provide solutions for any challenges that may arise.
