Open and Affirming Covenant of the First Congregational Church of Wallingford



A Message From the Interim Minister



I like to think of myself as reasonably intelligent and well informed. It is part of my job as pastor and preacher. But sometimes things happen that let me know I have more learning to do. I need to study harder, ask more questions, and perhaps listen to alternative points of view. That happened to me recently with all the headlines about DEI, Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. The headlines have been filled with challenges to DEI, DEI rollbacks, DEI firings, and suggestions to boycott companies that have rescinded on their commitments to DEI Policies and practices. There has been anxiety about how a rollback in DEI practices and policies may not just impact hiring practices and access to higher education, but also how it may effect special needs education, healthcare, accessibility to public spaces, and a myriad of other concerns.

I have seen those three letters floating around the headlines for years now, mostly in a positive light, but to be honest, I never knew what DEI was, at least in the headlines. I associated DEI with Dei. Dei is Latin for "of God." I guess sometimes you don't know what you don't know. The optimist in me thought it was wonderful that our culture recognized that Diversity, Equity and Inclusion were "of God." In my mind, I had taken it a step further to think of this way of thinking and being as "Imago Dei," also Latin, for the "In the Image of God." In my heart of hearts, I know Jesus is a proponent of DEI, because Jesus teaches us that each and every one of us is Dei, of God, and is created Imago Dei, in God's image. There are no exceptions. Through God, each of us is loved, seen, and cherished. Through God, each of us has equal worth. Through God, each of us deserves justice and the opportunity to thrive with whatever gifts we have been given.

For me, DEI is not a political argument, it is a spiritual challenge and expectation. It is up to me in these tumultuous times to keep close to my heart the immutable truth that each of us is Dei and Imago Dei. It is up to me to make choices that live into that truth.

A Message from the Moderators

A Special Giving Opportunity – the 350th Anniversary Gift Registry

2 Corinthians 9:6-8 "The point is this: the one who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and the one who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that by always having enough of everything, you may share abundantly in every good work."

As we journey through our 350th anniversary year, we will be holding events that bring us together in community and fellowship to honor generations past, to uplift the work of the present, and to build hope for the future of Christ's work in this place. Amidst the celebrations, we will be asking members and friends to reflect on the scripture passage above and to consider making special anniversary gifts to First Congregational Church to honor this milestone year in our church's history. The 350th Anniversary Team, in collaboration with the Administration Ministry, is in the process of developing an Anniversary "Gift Registry" of desired items/projects to enhance our facilities and our worship. We introduce this gift giving opportunity in the hopes that, by combining our efforts and bounty, we will be able to fund items on the Registry. Members and friends will be asked to review the Registry and consider making an anniversary gift, knowing that this gift would be in addition to one's annual pledged giving. The Registry is expected to include the following items, though others may also be added:

- Chancel carpeting (\$6,700)
- Remodeling of the hallway between the Guild Room and Congregational Hall (\$3,200)
- Kitchen Floor (\$6,650)
- Sanctuary insulation (\$32,000-\$40,000)
- Pew Cushions (\$30,000 \$35,000)
- Railing for the Chancel Stairs (\$800 \$1,200)
- Sanctuary Hardwood Refinishing (\$21,000 \$24,000)
- Video screens in sanctuary (TBD)
- Oven (TBD)
- Front Sign (TBD)
- Masonry Work (TBD)
- Steeple Light Repair (TBD)

We are excited to let you know that we have been approached by an Angel Donor who has offered Matching Funds to the Gift Registry effort! The Angel Donor has offered a 20% match for every gift made towards the Registry. So, for example, for every \$100 gift we receive, they will match with an additional \$20. The Matching Funds (in the prior example, the \$20) can be applied wherever it is needed on the gift registry list. The Angel Donor will offer this match up until a maximum donation on their part of \$60,000! This is truly an exciting opportunity for members and friends of the congregation to make a gift to this congregation that increases in value because of the Matching Funds of this Angel Donor!

As you may know, First Congregational Church has both a public Facebook page and a private Facebook page. It is exciting to see that the number of "followers" of both pages has been increasing! Given that, we thought it a good time to offer this information about the Church's Facebook presence.

The public Facebook page, titled <u>First Congregational Church of Wallingford</u>, <u>CT</u>, (https://www.facebook.com/firstchurchwallingford) is the page where <u>anyone</u> who is on Facebook or the internet can go to get basic information about our church. It is also the page where the livestreaming videos of our services appear and where general event announcements can be viewed.

The private Facebook page, titled First Congregational Church UCC, Wallingford, CT, (https://www.facebook.com/groups/73105377547/) is for members and friends of First Congregational Church Wallingford. In addition to general event announcements, the content of this page can include announcements directly relevant to our church members and friends, such as the Spire, information about congregational meetings and agendas, photos from events, and obituaries of members and friends of the congregation, if we have the family's permission. Only members of the private page can see its content, and, because of its more private content, one must request to join the page and be approved. When anyone requests to join the page, there are membership questions that need to be answered so that it can be determined whether the requestor has a legitimate reason to access the page. This is important because we have been scammed by people presenting themselves as friends of the congregation when they are not! If you or someone you know is wanting to join the page, please know that answering those questions is essential. We won't approve someone to join the page if we have no idea about their connection to the church.

On both pages, postings are limited to those which are directly related to our congregation and its activities. At times, there have been requests by members of the page to post general memes or content that is not directly related to church happenings. These requests are typically turned down because we do not want the Facebook pages to be diluted by non-church content, even if the memes are thoughtful or humorous.

We appreciate everyone's understanding if your meme or content is not published, and we hope this provides a clearer understanding of our Facebook presence. If you have any questions about Facebook or other social media issues, please direct them to Pastor Meredith or the Vision Board.

Our Liturgical Colors

The church liturgical year is divided into seasons: Advent; Christmas; Epiphany; Lent; Easter; and Pentecost. Different colored paraments (the cloth decorations hanging from the altar, pulpit, and lectern; as well as the banners hung above the altar) are used to express the ideas and emotions of each season.

The forty days of Lent, which begin Ash Wednesday, correspond to the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness. The **violet** paraments hung during Lent symbolize both the sovereignty of Christ as well as the repentance from sin.

During Holy Week, our tradition has been to change the paraments from violet to **white** on Maundy Thursday, symbolizing the church's rejoicing in the sacrament of the Last Supper. At the end of Maundy Thursday, the white paraments are removed and the altar is stripped bare, symbolizing the betrayal of Jesus and the empty tomb. **Black** paraments, the traditional color of mourning, are placed on the pulpit and lectern on Good Friday.

On Easter morning, the **white and gold** paraments celebrate the Risen Christ, and remain in place for fifty days, until Pentecost. On Pentecost Sunday, **red** paraments (with the descending dove) signify the Holy Spirit.

A future article will describe the Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, and "Ordinary Time" seasons.

The Worship Ministry has a team that faithfully takes care of and changes the paraments with each new liturgical season. If you are interested in joining this Altar Team, please contact Debby Voelker.





The ministry of ushering is a crucial part of worship because it is one of the most visible ministries in the church, nevertheless the usher performs a major role in ensuring that people see and experience that.

Supporting our country -

Supporting our local community -

Daphne's Brave Heart— With sadness in our hearts, we donated up to \$400 to Daphne's Brave Heart at Akron's Children's Hospital. The fund will help support families navigating childhood congenital heart disease diagnoses and open-heart surgery.
