How can it be that Fall 2025 is already upon us? We hope that you have had the opportunity this summer to enjoy some time with family and friends for rest, relaxation and renewal. While First Church has moved at a somewhat more relaxed pace over the summer months, it has also been a time when the congregation has come together to approve several significant changes that move us into yet another era of church life.

- (1) At our Annual Meeting on June 8, 2025, the congregation approved the adoption of the Ministry Model as our ongoing organizational structure. This model has been trialed for the last two years, and it is based on a system of Ministries led by coordinators with supportive teams to fulfill our Vision & Mission. Based on discussion at Vision Board meetings and at the Annual Meeting on June 8, we clearly need ongoing focus on communication, a clear understanding of where responsibilities fall, and succession plans that allow the ministries to navigate any changes in our staff and volunteers. The six Ministries (Administrative, Congregational Care, Faith Formation, Membership, Mission & Outreach, and Worship) and their respective teams, overseen by the Vision Board, will strive to work effectively, efficiently, and meaningfully to engage the congregation as a whole in walking the path God intends for us. Please review the overview of the Ministry and Team model and the roster of Vision Board officers and Ministry Coordinators that is included elsewhere in this Spire.
- (2) Members attending the Annual Meeting also approved the adoption of new bylaws that simplify and streamline our previous bylaws in ways that allow First Congregational Church more flexibility as we move into the future. With this change, Vision Board's attention will now be shifted to the development of a Policies and Procedures manual that will provide detailed information about the actions of each team in an effort to make clear all that it takes to uphold our Vision & Mission statements, our ONA covenant, and our service to God in this place.

At a special congregational meeting on June 29, 2025, the congregation came together again to make the challenging decision to sell the Meetinghouse to Chris Regan and Regan Holdings, LLC. The sale of the Meetinghouse officially closed on August 7, 2025, and the proceeds from the sale have been set aside in a fund independent of our endowment. As per the congregation's vote on June 29th, the principal of this fund cannot be used for at least 10 years without congregational approval. The income earned from the fund will be applied to the church's operating budget. On behalf of First Congregational Church, we lift up gratitude for all who came before us to establish the Meetinghouse as a physical asset that could now be converted to a monetary asset.

- (1) Further, we express gratitude for all who came together to reach a consensus about our decision regarding the Meetinghouse after many years of problem solving how to make the best use of this gift as we move forward into the future. Last but certainly not least, we are thankful to members of the Administration Ministry who helped to ready the Meetinghouse for closure and to Attorney Lars Edeen, Jr., who served as our legal counsel during the process.
- (2) Finally, at the July 14, 2025 meeting, the Vision Board reviewed and approved a church policy for staff and volunteers regarding possible interaction with ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) in the event that ICE representatives would come on church property. This policy was based on suggestions made by the United Church of Christ, and it has been reviewed with church staff. This policy appears elsewhere in this Spire, and we encourage all to review it. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact Pastor Meredith or Vision Board officers and coordinators.

As you can see, it has been far from a "quiet" summer, and many thanks go to multiple individuals who have helped to complete these significant tasks with God's guidance. Gratitude also goes to those who assisted with the summer church school program, assisted summer worship, provided music, and organized our ongoing mission work over these summer months.

As we move into September 2025 and we once again Catch the Spirit of a new program year, we continue the celebration of our 350th Anniversary Year. We are looking forward to sharing our anniversary joy at Celebrate Wallingford, to hosting a celebratory 350th concert in October, to exhibiting a special Art show in November, and to continuing our weekly Voices of Devotion project. We will be capping off the 350th year with a Star Ball in January. We look forward to seeing you at worship and these many upcoming events. The Holy Spirit is alive and at work in First Congregational Church. Please join us to Catch the Spirit once again!



Imagine Together: Vitality



First Congregational Church of Wallingford Ministry and Team Organizational Structure

Arising from our Core Values and Vision statement, our Mission statement was discerned to be the following: "We will foster spiritual growth, loving communication, and mutual care, thereby empowering us to confront issues that impact our community and the world including poverty, isolation, and exclusion."

The <u>VISION BOARD</u> empowers our work towards our church's Vision and Mission and delegates to the following Ministries and their Teams the authority to achieve these goals. It serves as the executive body of the church between meetings of the congregation to manage our strategic issues. Vision Board officers include the Moderators, Treasurer, and Clerk.

<u>WORSHIP MINISTRY</u> assists the minister(s) with the Church's regular and special services of worship and provides for the supply of the pulpit in the absence of the Ordained Minister. It determines the appropriateness of any use of the sanctuary and chapel. The Worship Ministry oversees the following Teams: Sacramental Ministry Team, Music Team, Altar Team, Flower Team, Choir, Audio Team, Greeters and Ushers Team, Bell Choir, Live Streaming Team, Bell Ringers.

<u>FAITH FORMATION MINISTRY</u> works with the staff to plan, coordinate, and implement spiritual and faith development programs for children, youth, and adults. Faith Formation Ministry oversees the following Teams: Adult Education Team, Church School Team, Confirmation Team, Youth Group Team, Bible Study, Youth Mission Trip, Women's Fellowship Breakfast.

MEMBERSHIP MINISTRY designs and carries out fellowship programs and events for members and for welcoming and recruiting new members to the congregation. It develops and supports communication avenues to inspire people. It works to welcome our involvement in fundraising activities. Membership Ministry oversees the following Teams: Communications Team, Book Club, Fellowship Events Team, New Member Team, Nominating Team, Scholarship Team, Rummage Sale Team, Fundraising Team, Church Fair Team, Historian, Delegates to the Association.

<u>CONGREGATIONAL CARE MINISTRY</u> initiates and oversees plans and programs for the care and welfare of members. Congregational Care Ministry oversees the following Teams: Good Cheer Team, Hospitality Team, Pastoral Relations Team, Visitation Team, Prayer Shawl.

MISSION AND OUTREACH MINISTRY is responsible for the education and involvement of the congregation in the needs and social concerns of local and worldwide communities. Mission and Outreach Ministry oversees the following Teams: Community Action Team, Monthly Mission Drives Team, Mission Funds Team, Open and Affirming Team, Wellness Groups Liaison Team, Scouting, FedEx Ministry Team.

ADMINISTRATION MINISTRY holds, cares for, and conserves the physical property of the Church, and it manages the investment and dispersal of funds of the Church. It employs and oversees staff in conjunction with the Minister as specified and appropriate. It prepares a budget to submit to the Vision Board. The Administration Ministry oversees the following Teams: Investment Team, Finances Team, Personnel Team, Property Team, Stewardship Team, Counting Team, Monday Morning Crew.

First Congregational Church Wallingford Safe Church Policy: What to Do if ICE Comes

First Congregational Church Wallingford welcomes all people, no matter their immigration status. Recently, executive orders from the current presidential administration changed a policy that used to limit ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) from coming into places like churches. This plan describes what to do in the unlikely event that ICE tries to come into the church or asks for information about people here. It also explains the rights of all visitors, staff, and volunteers, no matter their immigration status. Everyone who works or volunteers at the church should read and understand this plan.

Know Your Rights: What to Do if ICE Approaches You

- Stay calm. If ICE comes to you, ask them to show identification. Ask, "Am I free to go?"
 - o If they say yes, walk away and don't answer any questions.
 - o If they say no, you must follow their orders, but don't resist or run.
- 2. Use your right to stay silent. You can say:
 - "I want to use my right to stay silent."
 - o "I want to talk to a lawyer."
 - If they search your bag or purse, say, "I don't consent to this search."
- 3. You don't have to tell them anything about other people, and you don't need to share your information. Don't help ICE figure out who people are based on their language, where they come from, or anything else. This may violate their rights.
- 4. People who are watching can record what happens, as long as they don't get in the way and state that they are filming.
- 5. If they ask to enter or search the property, follow the guidelines below.

If ICE Asks to Enter Church Property

- 1. Ask for identification. Then contact these folks right away to review the situation:
 - During Sunday service: Minister, Moderators
 - o Any other time: Minister, Moderators
- 2. **Ask if they have a warrant.** ICE can be in **public areas** inside the church without a warrant, but they can't stop, search, or arrest people in those areas without a warrant.
- 3. If they only show an administrative warrant, or no warrant at all, do not let them enter private areas. You can say, "This is a private area. You can't come in without a judicial warrant."
- 4. Private areas at First Congregational Church are:
 - Minister's office
- 5. If they have a warrant, check to see that it is signed by a judge. A judicial warrant will say "U.S. District Court" or "State Court" at the top. Administrative warrants are not from a court. They say "Department of Homeland Security" and are on Forms I-200 or I-205. ICE cannot enter private areas without a judicial warrant or consent from the Church.

- Stay with ICE while they are there. Watch them to make sure they follow the rules in their warrant. If they search places not listed in the warrant, state that you object to the search and document it in your notes. You may record the search so long as you state you are doing so (don't do this if you feel unsafe).
- 2. If someone is arrested, ask where they're being taken. This information will help the person's family and lawyer find them.
- 3. Take notes or record what happens after they leave and share it with the Minister and the Vision Board. Write down:
 - o How many ICE agents were there?
 - What were they wearing? How were they armed?
 - o Did they make you believe you couldn't move or leave?
 - Did they treat anyone badly? How?
- 4. Reach out to local community resources if necessary to connect people with additional support.

If ICE Asks for Information About People

- 1. Do not ask about anyone's immigration status. Do not record information about immigration status.
- 2. **Don't give ICE lists or personal information for church staff or members** unless they show a judicial warrant for that information.
- 3. Keep information secure and private.
